This story is a memoir by a Norwegian journalist who lived with an Afghan family during the tumultuous months following 9/11. She weaves a history lesson of modern Afghanistan, while telling the stories of a real family trying to live everyday life with their country collapsing around them. It is an eye opening account that reveals the vast cultural differences between a fundamentalist Islam society and the West.

I love fiction or non-fiction that is set in another culture. A good tale that

is set with foreign customs, religion and food not only entertains, but informs. No need for me to tell the story; if this genre appeals to you—I recommend that you read it!

About Alice

Although a quick read, humorist Calvin Trillin's latest book, *About Alice*, is funny, moving and deeply personal. In it, Trillin remembers his late wife, who passed away in 2001 from cancer, through stories of their meeting, subsequent marriage and life together.

In general, this is a memorable

story because of Trillin's way of making Alice seem like the most wonderful person he's ever met. He admires so much about her, including the way she edited his writing; if she laughed, he knew it was good enough. Everything he wrote, he claims, he wrote with her in mind. Alice's quirksiness is special to him, too; he recalls a time when, as he introduces her to a crowd, she takes off a shoe and waves it at them.

Like Trillin, the reader admires Alice. Through a first bout with cancer (in 1976) and a determination to make it to her daughter's wedding, Alice was strong and practical. While a story of this nature has the ability to depress, *About Alice* does the opposite. Instead, Alice is inspiring and funny, and Trillin leaves the reader with the impression that hers was a life lived well.

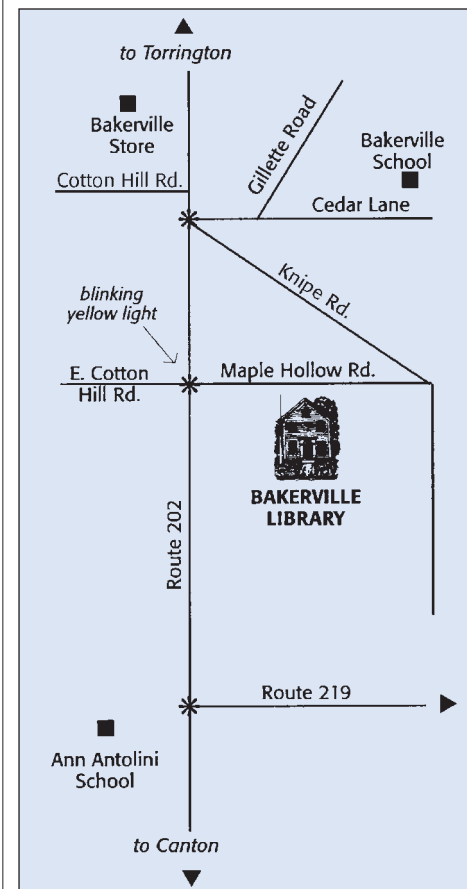
